Often, in his words of introduction to the "Our Father" prayer, Fr. Tom Hogan explains that each of us bears a family name, but in the time of Jesus, a person's name was perhaps even more important than it is today. This is because the meaning of your name was significant. Often, your name was tied to your mission in life, for example Noah's father Lamech "called his son Noah, saying, This shall comfort us concerning our work and toil of our hands, because of the ground which the LORD hath cursed". Therefore in Jesus time names in general has a readily understandable meaning. Jesus was no exception to this rule. His name was given to him by the Angel Gabriel and means "God Saves", appropriate for the one through whom God will lead his people out of darkness into a wonderful light.

The name of Jesus takes on extra significance in the New Testament after the resurrection. It becomes an expression of the power and presence of the risen Jesus, especially in the book of Acts. Here we see people perform works in the name of Jesus that he himself would do. In his name they teach (Acts 4:17-18), cast out demons (Acts 5:41) and heal the sick (Acts 4:10). These narratives point us to the power and potency of the Holy Name of Jesus. The reader is invited to believe that there is no difference whatsoever between St. Peter saying "I heal you in the name of Jesus" and Jesus himself performing the miracle.

A small manuscript kept in the Poor Clare Monastery, Galway archives recorded the day and date a picture to the Holy Name of Jesus was displayed. A note had been attached behind the picture saying 'it was in this convent of St. Clare the devotion was begun in Ireland in January 1914. With this reminder, the Poor Clares and Franciscans were prompted to ask our Holy Father, Pope Francis if the Franciscan Family could celebrate a special Year of the Holy Name of Jesus in 2014.

Pope Francis has granted the status of a Jubilee Year to Our Centenary celebrations, which commemorate a new wave of the devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus, which began in 1914. The aim of the Year is simple – to foster a renewed reverence and devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus, and in so doing to deepen personal love for the Lord Jesus and faithfulness to His Gospel among all people. The Year commemorates the centenary of the renewal in Ireland of devotion to the Holy Name initiated by Fr Francis Donnelly, OFM, of the Galway Abbey community. Fr. Donnelly was responsible for the little tiles you may sometimes see over the doors of shop-fronts or of people's houses. These blue tiles, placed over the doorway of thousands of homes in Cork, Limerick, Clare and Galway have often been mistaken as indicating homes which originally belonged to Gardaí, because of the similarity to the Garda crest. Others believed that they were mementoes of the International Eucharistic Congress of 1932. In truth, the tiles, which depict an abbreviation of the name of Jesus in Greek, were placed above the doors of houses and shops in order to invoke God's blessings.

During a Mass celebrating the opening of the Year, Hugh McKenna, OFM, Provincial outlined in his homily that from the earliest days of Christianity people began to realise that the name of Jesus was not

merely a series of letters, but that it had an intrinsic divine power. Wherever the name of Jesus is spoken or displayed the power of Jesus can be called upon to obtain peace, holiness and as a protection from evil." He believes that the Year "is an opportunity for Christians to rekindle in their hearts love for the Holy Name of Jesus. "We invoke the name of Jesus so easily and very often so carelessly without realising the significance and power of this name that has been venerated down through the centuries." It is hoped that this Year may bring a fresh awareness and belief in the power of the Holy Name of Jesus. As the Lord Himself has told us: 'If you ask anything of the Father, He will give it to you in My Name'. (Jn 16:23)

Let us not misuse the name of Jesus but rather invoke his name, call upon his name (1 Cor. 1:2) and praise his name. Like St. Paul tells us let us not be afraid to do everything in his name (Col. 3:17) and may we always remember, when we see one of the little blue tiles, which are present here in Ennis too, above houses and shops, that the day will come "when at the name of Jesus every knee should bend...and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord." (Phil. 2:10-11)

Corresponding rebates received in 2012 relate to contributions during 2011. Monies received were allocated to the same source as the original contributions.

INDEPENDENT REPORT TO THE ADMINISTRATOR, ENNIS PARISH:

I have reviewed the income and expenditure statement overleaf. A review includes an examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the statement.

Respective Responsibilities: The Administrator is responsible for preparing the income and expenditure statement in accordance with applicable law and Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland and for ensuring that adequate systems of internal control exist. My responsibility is to review the income and expenditure statement and to give an opinion on the truth and fairness of the information contained therein, together with my opinion on the correctness of the supporting books and records that I have obtained all the information and explanations which I considered necessary in order to provide me with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the statement is free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. This report is made solely to the Administrator of Ennis Parish. To the fullest extent permitted by law, I do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Administrator for my review work, for this report, or for the opinions I have formed. In forming my opinion I have also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the statement. Opinion: In my opinion the statement gives a true and fair view of the income and expenditure activities of the Parish Development Fund for the year ended 31st December 2013. I have obtained all the information and explanations I consider necessary for the purposes of my review. In my opinion proper books of account have been kept to support the income and expenditure statement. - We present an audited statement of account for Ennis Parish Development Fund for the year 2013. We thank
 parishioners for their loyal support and generosity during these very difficult economic times. This year showed a
 decline of 6.5% in contributions to the Development fund and a 14.8% decline in the Priests Collection contributions.
- The envelopes have served the Parish well and are vital in our eligibility to receive tax rebates from the Revenue Commissioners. We keep records of all identifiable contributions i.e. those who use weekly envelopes, standing orders or cheques. While we very much appreciate the generosity of parishioners who contribute to the baskets without using envelopes we are unable to receive tax rebates from these contributions.
- Stipends of €1,873.00 from the multi intentioned Mass on Sundays were forwarded to Pieta House, Cuan an Chláir and Grandparents Association; €2793 from Triduum Masses at Christmas, Easter and Exam Time and €675 from the Book of Intentions Mass were forwarded to Cuan an Chláir.
- The Trócaire Contributions in 2013 were: €26,238.00 Lenten Campaign; €23,820 Syrian & Philippines relief.
- Parishioners contributed €181,991 towards the 4 Priests Collections in 2013. In 2013 €41,742.00 was forwarded
 to Diocesan Priests Central Fund. A similar contribution will be made for 2013, ensuring all Priests of the Diocese
 receive an equivalent annual remuneration.
- Many people pay their parish contribution by standing order, it makes life easier for parishioners, and it enables the accurate recording of monies received. You can pay both your weekly contribution and priests collection by standing order. You can do this Monthly, Quarterly, Half yearly or Yearly whatever suits yourself. One standing order can cover both your weekly contribution for the upkeep of the Parish, and your contribution to the Quarterly Priests' collections. You specify how much of your contribution you wish to go towards the priests' collection and the balance will go towards Parish maintenance. Paying by standing order has a double benefit: it enables more accurate record keeping and helps the Parish Finance Committee with budgets. Fr. Jackie Sharpe - 50 Golden Years of Service

Kunkujang is a remote village in the semi barren region of The Gambia. It is home to the Manjago Tribe who came as refugees from the civil war in the neighbouring country of Guinea Bissau. The name Kunkujang translates as the "Field out there". For the past 40 years Fr. Jackie Sharpe has lived and worked with these people. He is affectionately known as the Manjago Priest. He has mastered their language, immersed himself in their culture and always shows the greatest respect and love for these migrant people.

Fr. Jackie was given permission by his Holy Ghost Superior to create a Catholic Mission among these migrants. Like St. Patrick he used their religion and culture to connect with Jesus and his Gospel. The first task Jackie set himself was the establishment of a school. There was much resistance from parents about the usefulness of school for their children, but they gradually began to see the value. Fr. Jackie's motto in life is "be kind and gentle under provocation." He refused to be frustrated and overcame all the opposition. A clinic was later established where primary health was provided finally a Church was erected for worship.

He had won their confidence and respect. Fr. Jackie has had tremendous support over the years from his family and friends. The generosity of Magrita Edennis a Swedish retired teacher and her efforts has enabled Fr. Jackie to expand the Primary School and eventually build a Secondary School.

The people of Ennis Parish through their generosity made it possible for Fr. Jackie to buy a school bus to transport the teaching staff from the larger urban centres to "the Bush" to staff the schools.


On March 1st Fr. Jackie was joined by his sister Tess Ryan and her husband Sean from Ennis, his brother Morgan and his wife Carmel from Dublin and his two nieces Catherin and Marie from Tipperary family of his deceased brother Billy, to celebrate his Golden Jubilee. We salute Fr. Jackie on his fifty years of missionary work in The Gambia. His evangelisation of animist people to Christianity. Through the schools he setup and education he has enabled migrants on the periphery of Gambian society to move towards the centre. From this Bush Parish Fr. Jackie has enabled two Priests and two Religious Sisters five Medical Doctors and scores of University Graduates to play a part in Gambian life as Teachers, Accountants, Civil Servants. He has put in place scholarships for several more young people to attend university. He has built a National Shrine to Our Lady Queen of Peace which hosts the largest gathering of Christians in The Gambia each year. Fr. Jackie Sharpe epitomises the contribution of generations of Irish Missionary Priests and Religious to the care and wellbeing of the least and the poorest on the planet.

Christopher Wren the famous architect of St. Paul's Cathedral in London inscribes on his own grave "if you seek his monument look around you". This is true for the Manjagoe People, their homes, small farms, cashew plantations, wells, schools, health centre, churches, education and sense of pride which have all been enhanced because a young Tipperary Man followed his dream and love of his God to make the difference.
