Third Sunday of Advent

(Year A)

15th December, 2019

The Crib, a place to reflect on the wonder of God's love.



The Nativity Scene or Crib can seem just like another Christmas decoration, but it's origins and deep spirituality go away back in history. In his recent *Apostolic Letter Admirabile signum*, Pope Francis tells a beautiful story of how St Francis had been struck by the mosaics in the Roman Basilica of Saint Mary Major depicting the birth of Jesus, close to the place where, according to an ancient tradition, the wooden panels of the manger are preserved. Francis had earlier visited the Holy Land, and the caves in Greccio reminded him of the countryside of Bethlehem. His dream was to recreate his sense of wonder and awe in a setting that was more accessible to all people.

The *Franciscan Sources* describe in detail what then took place in Greccio. Fifteen days before Christmas, Francis asked a local man named John to help him realize his desire "to bring to life the memory of that babe born in Bethlehem, to see as much as possible with my own bodily eyes the discomfort of his infant needs, how he lay in a manger, and how, with an ox and an ass standing by, he was laid upon a bed of hay". At this, his faithful friend went immediately to prepare all that the Saint had asked. On December 25th, friars came to Greccio from various parts, together with people from

the farmsteads in the area, who brought flowers and torches to light up that holy night. When Francis arrived, he found a manger full of hay, an ox and a donkey. All those present experienced a new and indescribable joy in the presence of the Christmas scene. The priest then solemnly celebrated the Eucharist over the manger, showing the bond between the Incarnation of the Son of God and the Eucharist. At Greccio there were no statues; the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present.

Dear brothers and sisters, the Christmas crib is part of the precious yet demanding process of passing on the faith. Beginning in childhood, and at every stage of our lives, it teaches us to contemplate Jesus, to experience God's love for us, to feel and believe that God is with us and that we are with him, his children, brothers and sisters all, thanks to that Child who is the Son of God and the Son of the Virgin Mary. And to realize that in that knowledge we find true happiness. Like Saint Francis, may we open our hearts to this simple grace, so that from our wonderment a humble prayer may arise: a prayer of thanksgiving to God, who wished to share with us his all, and thus never to leave us alone.



As we look at the tree during the holy season of Christmas may it fill our hearts with the joy and peace of Christ and let that joy and peace extend to our community and the whole world. Amen.

'Do This in Memory' Holy Communion Programme

The special clothes that the priest wears for Mass are called vestments. There are three different pieces which he needs to put on. Over his ordinary clothes the priest puts on a white or cream coloured tunic called an alb. Then he puts on a long piece of coloured cloth which looks like a scarf and is called a stole.

Over the alb and the stole he puts on his chasuble. The colour of the stole and the chasuble is very important. It tells us what season we are in or what special occasion we are celebrating in the Church year. There are four main colours worn during the Year: green, purple, red and white and this weekend the Priest wears Rose vestments. This vestment is only worn on the 3rd Sunday of Advent and 4th Sunday of Lent.
