Fourth Sunday of Advent (Year A)

22nd December, 2019

Over the centuries there have been many powerful leaders in our world, many dictators and indeed we have had many of these in the last 100 years. The Tzar in Russia, Hitler in Germany, Mugabe in Zimbabwe, Idi Amin in Uganda. Some of these leaders seize power but many of them were elected and were popular in their own countries.

All of these people believed that they knew what was best for their own people and for the world and that their rule would make a difference. But we all know power can corrupt and there is lots of corruption in many places.

Many others get involved in politics believing in the democratic system. If they make it into a position of power they feel that they can change things for the better.

Many other people believe in Education, they believe that educating people will help to change their lives and that we will have a better, more just world. We are all people of hope, looking ahead, looking for a better world and for better times.

The Jewish people were a people who lived in difficult circumstances. They were occupied by the Romans, they had been exiled many times through the centuries, they were leaderless. They looked forward to a Messiah who would free and liberate them. They were thinking of people like Kind Solomon or King David, a person of great power and influence. But as we know God's way is not our way. Who could have believed the Messiah would have come as a helpless child, born to a young woman like Mary. Who would have believed that Jesus could have brought salvation to mankind. His life seemed to be a failure. Many of his supporters deserted him

and he died as a criminal on the cross. You would have been forgiven for believing that was the end of Jesus and the Christian way. But again Christ's way is not our way.

Christ has made such a difference to humanity for the last 2 thousand years. He does not depend on anybody in power or politics. He depends on all of us to welcome him into our lives and to witness to his way.

He comes to us in the most ordinary and simple of ways. We have to stay with him, like Mary, despite all difficulties that might come the way. He is our hope, our future, our Messiah. This is what we celebrate at Christmas time.



So let us welcome him in a new way into our lives, our homes and our communities, so that we may have life and have it to the fullest.

'Do This In Memory' First Communion Programme

THE READINGS: The Minister of the Word goes to the ambo to read. The first reading is usually from the oldest part of the Bible called the Old Testament. In the Easter Season the first reading comes from the New Testament. The stories that we hear during the first reading are the same stories that Jesus would have heard when he was a child. Some of the stories from the Old Testament are thousands of years old. They remind us of how long people have been listening to God's word. They also tell us how much God loves us. Even though the stories are very old, they still have an important message for us today. THE PSALMS: The psalms are different from the other readings from the Bible. They were written as poems or songs. There are 150 psalms altogether. Sometimes the psalm is sung. Between each verse there is a response which we are all invited to say. The psalm allows us to reflect on the reading that we

SECOND READING: This reading always comes from the part of the Bible called the New Testament. The reading is taken from the books that are found directly after the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans Rm 1:1-7

From Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus who has been called to be an apostle, and specially chosen to preach the Good News that God promised long ago through his prophets in the scriptures.

This news is about the Son of God who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead. Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name.
