## THANK YOU TO OUR FRONTLINE WORKERS

As I write I have been waiting three days for an important text, a text that says "that the test did not detect COVID 19". I do not have symptoms but was tested as part of a general testing of staff in a care facility. The knot forming in my gut

about this is not about me. I reckon I could put up a fair fight against COVID. My concern is for the residents I am in contact with every day. Being part of their lives brings a responsibility to be meticulous in following the guidelines and keeping contacts to a minimum so that I don't become the cannula that delivers a lethal payload to the most vulnerable. It's Monday night now, some colleagues got the good news text on Saturday .....I still wait ...... what if?? What about everyone to whom I gave Holy Communion, everyone whose wheelchair I pushed? Did I do everything correctly? Are they still protected even if this test goes belly-up for me.

This has been the story of staff in care homes all over the country every week for the past three or four weeks.

For a chaplain, physical contact is minimal thank God. For the care staff physical contact is unavoidable. They are the frontline heroes who provide the ring of steel to protect the vulnerable. They have done so for months now, not in the high drama we associate with Grey's Anatomy, but in an atmosphere where the most routine and mundane actions assume the stress of being calculated and deliberate because the life of someone you care about depends on you. The term "Frontline" means different things to different people. For staff in acute hospitals, it's about saving the lives



of those already infected. They are right there in the pain and anguish of the struggle with illness, sometimes in the pain of loss and hopefully, too, to experience the joy of recovery. For others closer to home it's about

prevention, about being part of a ring of steel that can be breached at any moment. The enjoyable friendly banter and craic can change almost instantaneously. We once lived in a world where a temperature or a cough was routine, but not anymore. They now trigger the precautions of isolation, testing and PPE. Staff can be good at remaining calm and reassuring on the outside but beneath the visors and gowns every healthcare worker is thrown onto an emotional, adrenalin fuelled, rollercoaster. They are faced with the daunting question; "what if?" Is our ring of steel about to become a house of cards?

In today's Gospel, the apostles discovered resources they didn't realise that they had. Throughout this pandemic amazing people, when faced with crisis, when faced with the darkest times, found strength deep within themselves to rise to the challenge. We salute our frontline staff, starting right here in this parish. We acknowledge your amazing contribution and the sacrifices you have made to protect. If Jesus fed five thousand with the apostles' few loaves and fish, you cannot even begin to imagine the impact that your contribution continues to have on countless lives. Thank you!

## From A Distance Free Concerts



From A Distance is a community initiative encouraging people to recommence socializing safely after lockdown. These 30-40 minute bi-weekly concerts will allow people to see some familiar faces From A Distance while also enjoying some musical treats from local talents such as Mike Hanrahan, Monica Morgan Kearney, Joan Hanrahan and friends, and many more to be announced.

These concerts will take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 2pm, free of charge, for the month of August in SS Peter and Paul Cathedral Ennis. The Civil Defence will be present to ensure all guidelines are followed and safety measures are in place.

Cocooning has seen many vulnerable members of our society isolated from friends, family for a substantial length of time. Now that lockdown is over, these concerts aspire to create a safe welcoming environment to bridge the fears, worries, and doubts people may have about getting out again to enjoy live music and entertainment.

Dr. Maire Finn has spoken about the struggles people are experiencing in physical and mental health as the world settles into its "new normal".

Bishop Willie Walsh has said, "I found the lockdown relatively easy. But now that things are reopening and our towns are getting busier, it feels more challenging in ways".

From A Distance will commence on Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> August 2020 with concerts set to take place every Tuesday and Thursday at 2pm in SS Peter and Paul Cathedral Ennis. ## Sr. Carmel Scanlan RIP

Sr. Carmel died peacefully on Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> July in McAuley House, Limerick. Patricia was born on the 13<sup>th</sup> November, 1928, was the second of six children born to John Scanlan and Margaret O'Farrell of Gortmagee, Killaloe, Co. Clare. She was educated at the Mercy Primary School, Killaloe and as a boarder in St. Joseph's Secondary School, Spanish Point. She is predeceased by her sister Monica (Hayes) and her brothers Patrick and Eddie Joe; she is survived by her sister Maureen (Ryan) and brother Fr. John Brendan, Manchester, UK.

Patricia joined the Sisters of Mercy in Ennis on the feast of the Presentation, 21st November, 1948 and took the name Carmel at her formal reception the following year. Her profession of perpetual vows was made in July, 1955. Carmel trained as a Nurse in the Mater Hospital, Belfast. On qualifying in 1955 she spent one year on the staff of Nenagh General Hospital before being appointed to the staff of St. Joseph's Hospital, Ennis, then known as the County Home. Ten years later when a special unit, St. Senan's, for the care of severely handicapped children and young adults, was opened in the grounds of St. Joseph's Hospital here in Ennis, Carmel was appointed Sister-in-Charge. This was an assignment she at first found difficult to accept but excelled at it, in her warm, caring and prayerful way, at a time when resources were minimal and understanding of the real needs of special children was underdeveloped. The Unit soon filled to its 24-person capacity. There are many touching accounts of the kindness with which these young people were treated. Health & Safety issues were yet to come to prominence, so Carmel cajoled ambulance drivers and others to take her young charges on trips to the seaside or into the countryside; she also wangled places for them on Diocesan pilgrimages to Knock and Lourdes! Carmel could be described as the Mother Teresa of Ennis in the way she cared for the children, holding by the hand, bringing them on walks. Apart from a sabbatical year at Maynooth in 1978, Carmel stayed with the Unit until it closed in 1989 on the transfer of the residents to Bawnmore, Limerick. Carmel then moved from nursing to pastoral work, visiting the sick in their homes, hospitals and nursing homes. When St. Joseph's Convent closed in 1998 Carmel opted to transfer to St. Mary's, Nenagh, where she continued her pastoral ministry. Declining health necessitated her move to McAuley House in 2018.

Those who lived and worked with Carmel describe her as a woman of extraordinary commitment to prayer and having a child-like trust in the providence of God; she had a particularly strong devotion to Mary, having taken as her motto, 'To Jesus through Mary'. Carmel was a very private person, especially about family and her travels – and she did many a journey and pilgrimage which only came to light after the event. She followed Pope St. John Paul 11 to each of his venues on his Irish visit in 1979. Three years later when the same Pope visited the UK, Carmel was spotted on TV at the Manchester gathering, acting as Minister of the Eucharist – her brother's parish was in the Manchester area and she had quietly gone on pilgrimage once more. She even appeared on television attending the funeral of Charles J. Haughey!

Carmel will be sadly missed by her immediate and extended family, friends, former colleagues and her Mercy Community, to all of whom we extend our sincerest sympathy. May her faithful soul rest in the peace of Christ.



#### Mí Lúnasa.

I mí Lúnasa, ceiliúraimis an fómhar. Duine de na déithe ba thábhachtaí i gcultúr na gCeilteach ab ea Lugh. Féile a bhí ann le fáiltiú roimh fhás an arbhair agus roimh thús an fhómhair. Is minic a bhíodh daoine in Éirinn ag déanamh damhsaí agus tinte cnámha le Féile Lúnasa a cheiliúradh. Bhí cuid de na nósanna seo beo go fóill go dtí an fichiú haois. De réir an tseanchais ba laoch, file, cruitire, taidhleoir, státaire agus ceardaí é Lugh. Is uaidh a shíolraigh ainm na míosa, Lúnasa, an chéad mhí den fhómhar. In aimsir na gCeilteach ceapadh gur ón ngrian a tháinig torthaí na talún. Tháinig Naomh Pádraig agus mhúin sé gur chruthaigh Dia teas na gréine agus báisteach na spéire chun plandaí a chur ag fás. In August, we celebrate the harvest. Lugh was one of the most important gods in pre-Christian Celtic Culture. Dancing and bonfires were engaged in to celebrate the Feast of Lugh. Some of these customs were still alive until the twentieth century.

According to folklore Lugh was a warrior, a hero, a poet, a harpist, a diplomat, a statesman and a craftsman. August (Lughnasa) the first month of Autumn is named after him. In pre-Christian times it was thought that all the crops came from the sun and without it there would be no food and they would die. St. Patrick came and taught that God created the heat of the sun and the rain to help the growth of plants. We thank God for everything that grows.

In the Bible we read that there is: A time to be born, a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up that which is planted.... (Ecclesiastes 3:2—3). Lord be with us during the month of August.

To Christ the seed, to Christ the crop, in barn of Christ may we be brought. To Christ the sea, to Christ the fish, in nets of Christ may we be caught. From growth to age, from age to death, Thy two arms here, O Christ, about us. From death to end, not end but growth, in blessed Paradise may we be. Amen.
