

Triduum of Prayer to St. Joseph The Sleeping St. Joseph



We welcome you to pray with us for three days this week on Thursday, Friday & Saturday as we celebrate St. Joseph.

On Friday 19th March we celebrate the Feast of St. Joseph and this year Pope Francis has declared it the year of St. Joseph.

Pope Francis has a great devotion to St. Joseph and has a statue of a sleeping St. Joseph on his desk for decades. During the world meeting of families in the Philippines in 2015, he shared his love for the saint.

"Even when he is asleep, he is taking care of the church!. Yes! We know that he can do that . So when I have a problem, a difficulty, I write a little note and I put it underneath St. Joseph, so that he can dream about it!. In other words, I tell him pray for the problem"

The basis of this devotion is Matthew's Gospel where he tells of four dreams in which Joseph is visited by an angel of the Lord and receives specific instruction and warnings of impending danger. All four dreams relate to the nativity of Jesus and his early life.

The triduum will take place at 7.30pm mass on Thursday & Friday and at the 11am mass on Saturday. You can listen online and the parish radio. A triduum of prayer sheet will be available in the Cathedral and can be downloaded on the Parish Website.

Friary News



Lent reminds us that letting go is a natural part of life. In the face of Covid-19, we complain that this global pandemic has put us out of our way e.g. curtailing travel, imposing restrictions, having to wear masks, adhering to social distancing with only a few being allowed to congregate in a shop or a Church for a funeral. "Feat" of getting the dreaded virus is really calling the shots. Large gatherings of people in stadia (for football games), in arenas (for concerts), in churches (for praying at services) have all been forbidden. Many feel disconnected and isolated.

"Does our religious tradition have anything to tell us how to respond?" The image of the Titanic comes to mind. Those on board this cruise-liner thought they were safe, that this ship was unsinkable but it sank on its maiden voyage. Those who survived managed to get on board a smaller life-boat. Life, even Covid, can be like that viz. finding kindred soulmates during difficult times. These are people with whom we can share faith and pray. Like those on the life-boat, they are survivors who want to stay alive, not just physically but also desire to be spiritually nourished.

Some years ago, when my brother was dying of cancer, the one thing that seemed to lift his spirits was phoning my mother. This confirmed for me that our first carers, the primary and significant people in our lives, always remain central to our hearts. This is probably why so many people buy cards and flowers for Mothers' Day. It reminds me of something I came across the other day:

"For most of us, our mothers were the first love, and the quality of our relationship throughout life is influenced by the earliest one. A mark of real maturity is the ability to see our mothers simply as human beings - loveable, fallible, interesting, and imperfect, just like ourselves. Some of us have suffered a mother's early death; some of us cope bravely with her long illness. Few of us have a simple, easy relationship with our mothers. Too much is at stake. The infant who needs its mother's arms lives on within us.

Few of us have such a continuous bond with our mothers, but we're fortunate if we can have an adult relationship that includes the love and nurturing we crave, because we never get past the need for it. The most successful intimacy seems to be based on reciprocal nurturing, for we need to give as well as to receive."

As another Mothering Sunday approaches, we thank you for all your on-going kindness and support and want you to know that we take none of this for granted. You and all your loved ones are constantly remembered in our daily Masses and prayers.

A reading from the second Book of Chronicles

2 Ch 36:14-16.19-23

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its Sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep Sabbath throughout the days of its desolation'.

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up".
