The Ascension of the Lord (Year B) 16th May, 2021.

In a recent interview in the Irish Times, Stephen Roche (professional cyclist) made reference to his faith in the Following words, "keep whispering your dreams, you never know when your angel is listening". A reminder that the faith you and I cherish, is the assurance of

hoped things for. the conviction of things not seen. We can't see electricity but we are sure it and our utility provider supplies us with the invoice to prove it. Likewise, when we visit an ATM, we are certain that our bank has our money, and when we key in our pin number it is dispensed.

So too, faith isn't a blind leap into the dark but a gift of the Holy Spirit through which we put our trust in God's promises. God is saying to each of us, 'Come with me on a great adventure and peer into the rich and deep mystery of a faith that is meant to be shared'.

New Testament scholar, JB Phillips encourages us to recover our sense of vocation, that we are not an organization of people who have a common interest in religion. It is a fine thing to know that we are 'right' with God, converted, born again' and all the rest of it, but after a while such experiences become stale and unsatisfying, unless, we are passing the Gospel message on to others, definitely bringing to bear upon actual human situations the pattern of Christian living.

In Jesus ascension into heaven that was at the heart of his message to his disciples and to you and I. Our challenge is to rediscover some of the urgency of that mission, to you and I to spread the Gospel message. The power of the Holy Spirit living within us is a power which we receive at our Baptism and Confirmation, and which we can call on at all times to guide us on our mission to bring the Gospel

message to life. That is our privilege.

In his Ascension into heaven the Lord has not deserted us, rather, the Church and especially The Eucharist is the continuation of Christ Presence on earth and that each of us has a job to do, a role to play in the continuing drama of Christ's saving work on earth.

Such is our privilege.



Friary News

Many of us have found this past year very frustrating and there is a sense of relief that we are now able to return to some sense of normality. We are definitely aware that the lockdown has been particularly difficult for those living alone. Having the webcam installed in the friary was a good move and people now have a choice to come in person or to tune into Mass in the friary. From May 14th, we will be able to open our Mass Office doors in accordance with government guidelines. Once again, for those who are unable to make it to the Mass Office, Mass Cards are still available if you ring 087-4697971. Just leave your name and contact number and we will get back to you. Like elsewhere, as a community, we are fewer and older. Hence, we have to cut our cloth to measure. This means that the friary timetable has undergone some minor changes since lockdown. However, within the official guide-lines offered, we would like to be available to people as much as possible. This is our present time-table:

Daily Masses: Mon - Sat. 10am

Sunday Masses: Sat.7.30pm, Sun. 10.30am. Confessions: Tues - Sat. 11-12noon, 4-5 pm

from Tuesday, May 25th onwards St. Anthony's Novena (June 4th-13th)

Two Masses each day: 10am and 7.30 pm Blessing of children: Sat June12th at 4 pm. Healing Mass: First Sunday of every month at

3pm (starting in July)

There is a sense in which "healing" is slightly different to "curing." The latter is really about getting back to where we were before we got sick, whatever sickness might have afflicted us. My sense is that "healing" goes deeper. With healing, we may not get physically well but at others levels (emotionally and spiritually), we feel that some sort of a shift has occurred and, so, we are no longer as angry or as alienated as we previously felt. In this sense, some sort of reconciliation has happened, often at a mysterious level, where we no longer feel the bitterness of what was said or done to us. While we would like to have sacramental "anointing" as an essential part of this afternoon, we are aware of the restrictions of the present pandemic. Therefore, until our present situation changes, our Healing Sunday Mass will incorporate Rosary, a Healing Prayer, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament as well as Mass itself and we hope to introduce this on the first Sunday of each month, starting on July 4th.

Go ndéana siad gach iarracht tacú le dínit an duine trí fhocail agus íomhánna. Tabhair géarchúis dóibh. Go dtaga an Spiorad Naomh chugainn go léir agus go ndéana sé finnéithe dínn os comhair an tsaoil ar Shoiscéal ár dTiarna Íosa Críost. Áiméan.

Today we are celebrating the Ascension of Our Lord Jesus Christ and we recall Jesus returning to His Father. His mission of teaching, his Passion and Resurrection have been completed and the day of victory has arrived. The disciples had spent over three years with Jesus and loved him greatly. It is not surprising that they felt lonely and anxious when He was leaving them to go back to his Father. Jesus had a vision for his disciples which was to spread the kingdom of his love, the Good News. "Go into the whole world and spread the Good News". (Mark 16:15) Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to guide and give them courage which he did on Pentecost Sunday.

Today is World Communications Day. This year Pope Francis has declared 'Come and see' (John 1: 46) as the theme for 2021. This was the first communication Jesus had with his disciples. We live in the technological age. The media has an obligation to promote the truth. This is not always the case. We pray: God of truth who enlightens us, quide the media. May they endeavour to support the dignity of the person through words and images. Give them discernment. May the Holy Spirit come to us and give us the courage to be witnesses to Our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout

Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'
