Sheep Without a Shepherd

Jesus saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd.

A story from the life of Mother Teresa shows her love for lonely and unwanted people, the "sheep without a shepherd," who, while materially well-off, are sometimes "the poorest of the poor." On one occasion, she visited a well-run nursing home where good food, medical care and other facilities were offered to the elderly. As she moved among the old people, she noticed that none of them smiled unless she touched them and smiled at them first. She also noticed that many of them kept glancing expectantly towards the door while listening to her. When she asked one of the nurses why this was so, she was told: "They are looking for a visit from someone related to them. But, except for an occasional visit, birthday gift or a get-well card, this never happens."

Jesus invites us, in today's Gospel, to show concern, mercy and compassion for such sheep without a shepherd. All that is required is an open heart. When we care, we are living the Gospel.

My Yoke is Easy....

One of the ironies of today is that, while we have far more labour-saving devices, we seem to have less and less time. Meals are quick and easy, but a new study shows that only one third of families sit around a table together for dinner. We go to great lengths to make sure we always carry our phones for fear that we should be out of the loop, even for the shortest time. If the mobile phone is momentarily misplaced this causes a flurry of panic. The hurry and worry of daily life seem to be increasing. Thoughts of solitude or quiet are distant memories.

Solitude and quiet are, however, at the heart of Jesus' prayer life. Before any significant moment in His ministry, Jesus spent time in prayer and often called His disciples away to a lonely place where they could be alone. It is only by silencing the noise in our hearts and minds that we can hear that still, small voice of God speaking to us, watching over us and guiding us.

Sometimes this 'time out' can be a luxury and we become like Yeat's old priest, Peter Gilligan, overcome with the demands of life. Then we look to the example of Christ, a Good Shepherd, who took pity on people. Even though he desperately needed peace and rest Himself, Jesus put those who had followed him first.

We can see this selflessness repeated all around us - the father who gets up repeatedly during the night to care for his sick child; the woman who dresses the wounded leg of her neighbour every day; the teacher who daily gives her very best to the children entrusted to her care. Let us pray that we too will have the courage and endurance to do what is necessary, and the faith that God will not lay a burden on our shoulders that is too heavy for us to

Naomh Camillus de Lellis.

Tá Lá Fhéile Camillus de Lellis ar an 18 Iúil. Rugadh é sa bhliain 1550. Fuair a mháthair bás nuair a bhí sé an-óg agus d'fhás sé aníos gan smacht. Chaith sé tamall dá shaol ina rógaire reatha. le saighdiúireacht agus le cearrbhachas nó gur iompaigh Dia chuige féin é. Ansin chuaigh Camillus isteach in Ord na gCaipisíneach ach b'éigean dó imeacht de bharr na bhfiolún ar a chosa. Thriail sé ar an Róimh .Bhí sé an- tugtha do chúram na neaslán agus chuaigh sé i mbun oibre i gceann de na hospidéil ann. Thosaigh sé ag staidéar le bheith ina shagart agus ornaíodh é .Bhunaigh sé Ord de shagart a mbeadh sé mar de chúram orthu freastal ar dhaoine breoite sna hospidéil agus ina dtithe cónaithe. D'éag sé sa bhliain 1614. D'fhógair an Pápa Leo X111 Naomh Camillus ina éarlamh ar ospidéal agus tithe leighis.

Is féidir linn an phaidir seo a rá ar son daoine breoite: Guímis orthu siúd atá breoite, in ospidéil agus sa bhaile, go bhfaighidís leigheas trí idirghuí Naomh Camillus. Áiméan.

The Feast of St. Camillus is celebrated on the 18 July. He was born in 1550. His mother died when he was very young and he grew up without parental discipline spending part of his life being a soldier and given to gambling. Camillus turned to God and joined the Capuchin Order but was forced to leave because of ulcers in his feet. He went to Rome. He was very devoted to the care of the sick and began to work in one of the hospitals there. He studied for the priesthood and was ordained. He founded an order of Priests whose mission was to serve the sick in hospitals and in their homes. He died in 1614. Pope Leo X111 proclaimed Saint Camillus patron of hospitals and nursing homes. The following prayer is for the sick: Let us pray for those who are sick in hospitals or at home. May they be healed through the intercession of Saint Camillus. Amen.
