Gospel John - 20:19-31

The difficulty for want of a better word about Easter is that for many it's associated with holidays and as these now come to an end, the cycle of work and life continues as normal, schools re-open and we move into the season of exams, Holy Communions, Weddings and whatever. But in church we will continue to celebrate the season of Easter, the Rising of Jesus and his appearances to those with whom he was intimately connected right up until the day of Pentecost in five weeks or thereabouts. This will continue while for so many the thoughts of celebrating Easter are being left behind, if not already gone.

Which is why reflecting on today's Gospel is so important - it is as dramatic and impacting as the Resurrection itself.

There are three clear elements in this Gospel of John.


- 1] Peace
- 2] Being Sent out on Mission and
- 31 Belief

And look how all of them are brought together.

Jesus breathes on them it recalls how God in the creation story of Genesis breathed life to make the first human. So now Jesus breathes new life into his people. His followers. It is post-Resurrection, post-Easter and they should be rejoicing.

Why are they afraid? Why do they have closed doors? All that Jesus had said would happen is happening, so they should be brave even before this.

Today, the Gospel speaks to you. Jesus breathes life into you, giving you peace - that's his peace we offer one another, not our own. That is what we must remember when offering the sign of peace at Mass. It's not your peace being offered; it is the great gift of Jesus himself and who are we to withhold it?

The news of Pope Francis' death on Easter Monday Morning has left the Catholic Church and our world in deep sadness and grief.

Pope Francis will be remembered for his humility, compassion and unwavering commitment to the poor. He brought a fresh pastoral approach to the papacy. His emphasis on God's Mercy, Social Justice and care for Creation reached out to so many outside the Catholic Faith.

From washing the feet of prisoners, to his bold encyclical 'Laudato Si', he challenged the Church and the world to embrace a more inclusive and compassionate approach to life and living.

In a very divided world, he reached out to people of other faiths and no faith, advocating for refugees and urging reconciliation where division and conflict exist.

Pope Francis lived simplicity and by example he challenged all of us to do S0.

At the time of his death he was working on encouraging Synodality in the church, where every voice is valued and respected and the Holy Spirit allowed to influence decision making.

As we mourn his death this weekend, we give thanks for his witness to the Gospel.

We pray for the repose of his soul and for our church as it prepares to elect a new shepherd.

Rest gently Pope Francis.

And, of course, He is present in a particular way in the Eucharist, in the breaking of the bread. This act reminds us of the many meanings of breaking the bread for Jesus Himself with His life and after resurrection.



A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

Apo 1:9-13.17-19

My name is John, and through our union in Jesus I am your brother and share your sufferings, your kingdom, and all you endure. I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the Lord's day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.' I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lamp - stands and, surrounded by them, a figure like the Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One.

I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld.

Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

Gospel Acclamation Alleluia, alleluia!

Jesus said: 'You believe because you can see me

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John Jn 20:19-31

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven;

for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

> 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.
